


The terra cotta editions of contemporary American sculpture produced by the Dorothy Paris Workshop are the result of three years of research and experiment in the coloring, molding and firing of terra cotta to produce editions of sculpture that are permanent in color, weather-resistant, and otherwise durable. They are produced with the cooperation and support of twelve of America's leading sculptors.


The editions of contemporary American sculpture produced by the Dorothy Paris Workshop are the result of considerable study and research to make available works of art that are priced according to purchasing power today. They are not to be confused with reproductions in the usual meaning of the term. They are not casts. Each piece is individually treated. Each is hand pressed into a mold—some molds are as complicated as to include forty sections. Each is hand finished before firing. Modern industrial firing methods, however, permit low cost production. And these modern methods are combined with the traditional and venerable material that is terra cotta.

Twelve of America's most noted sculptors have lent their support to the Dorothy Paris Workshop methods, and works by the following are now available:

The clay mixes used by the Workshop are known in the field as Miss Paris' own formulae and are named for her: Dorothy Paris Body #1, Dorothy Paris Body #2, etc. The colors used are a part of the clay bodies. Therefore, they are permanent and cannot chip off. The clay bodies are baked at high temperatures for as long as thirty-six hours to assure durability, quality and permanence. This unique process makes each piece a work of art.
