NASSOS DAPHNIS, born near Sparta in Greece in 1914 of American parents, came to this country in 1930. Contemporary Arts saw his work in the 1938 "Independent" Exhibition and in the fall of that year introduced him as a primitive painter. In this phase of his art, he was much acclaimed and his work entered fine private collections and was also placed in the museums of Buffalo, N. Y., Providence, Rhode Island, and Baltimore, Md.

Then came the war. The complete change of environment, the mingling with all types of Americans, the great opportunity of seeing the art of the old world, in Florence, Rome and Naples, and the thoughts engendered through the death and destruction around him, completely changed his lyrical outlook on life. These influences did not take away his poetic approach. For a time his color became muted, — dark skies, stark broken tree trunks were his themes, but always a ray of light, a hope of better things. Out of this grew strong sweeping shapes and a vivid though subtle color began to appear.

In 1947, Contemporary Arts gave him a second one man exhibition in which could be found examples of the last two periods. There was much groping evidenced in these paintings. In his third exhibition an authority has come to him. His forms are full and satisfying, his color extremely beautiful, while here and there a sombre note still sounds. Contemporary Arts is happy to present Mr. Daphnis in his third exhibition under its auspices.
